My shower drain is slow. What can I do?

Start with simple cleaning methods before calling a plumber. Most slow shower drains are caused by hair, soap scum, and mineral buildup that you can often clear yourself.

Remove visible debris first by taking off the drain cover (usually just lifts out or unscrews) and pulling out any hair or soap buildup you can see. Use needle-nose pliers or tweezers to grab stubborn clogs. This alone often solves the problem.

Try a baking soda and vinegar treatment for deeper cleaning. Pour one cup of baking soda down the drain, followed by one cup of white vinegar. Cover the drain with a wet cloth for 15-30 minutes, then flush with hot water. This natural method breaks down soap scum and organic matter without harsh chemicals that could damage your pipes.

For stubborn clogs, use a drain snake or zip-it tool (available at any hardware store for under \$5). These flexible tools can reach deeper into the drain to pull out hair clogs that liquid cleaners can't dissolve. Avoid chemical drain cleaners as they can damage pipes and are harsh on Ottawa's older plumbing systems.

Can I install subway tile in my shower myself?

Yes, you can install subway tile in your shower yourself if you have solid DIY skills, but this is a challenging project that requires careful attention to waterproofing and proper technique. Many experienced DIYers successfully tackle shower tiling, though it's definitely more complex than tiling a kitchen backsplash.

The biggest challenge isn't the tiling itself - it's the waterproofing preparation. Before any tile goes up, you need a proper waterproof membrane system behind the tile. This typically involves cement backer board, waterproof membrane (like Schluter-Kerdi or RedGard), and proper sealing at all corners and penetrations.
